Supporting Traumatic Brain Injury & Epilepsy Awareness

We were honored to participate in several very important advocacy efforts this spring that were organized to raise awareness and support those impacted by epilepsy and traumatic brain injury.

Capabilities recognized Purple Day on March 26, 2018, which is an international grassroots effort dedicated to increasing awareness and reducing stigma about epilepsy worldwide.

We were excited to participate in Brain Injury Advocacy Day in Albany where staff met with legislators and stakeholders advocating for programs and services that support brain injury survivors.



Medicaid Service Coordination Update

On July 1st 2018 our MSC department went through major changes. On a statewide level Medicaid Service Coordination transitioned to something new called Health Home Care Management. All three of our Medicaid Service Coordinators are now Care Managers. CPI chose to partner with one of the four Care Coordination Organizations or CCO's in our area that oversees this program, Tri County Care. All 65 of our MSC families chose to work with Tri County care and so far we have had a very smooth transition. We are working very closely with Tri County Care on a daily basis to learn and understand all of the changes and are confident that Tri County Care will be able to serve our families in the best way possible. We are excited to be a part of a new system that allows for enhanced and more comprehensive care. In addition our department has a new staff member on board. Kate Yeager is our full time Community Service Coordinator. Kate is handling our intakes and Family Empowerment Fund requests. Kate is also helping families to obtain OPWDD eligibility. For individuals that reach out to us needing information and guidance Kate is a great resource and is able to link families to needed services and helps them to access the resources available in their community. Job Placement Spotlight on Marcus

Marcus Daitch provides us with a wonderful example in what happens when organizations work together and someone with Marcus' talent is allowed to flourish. Marcus came to Mount Saint Mary College a couple of years ago through the support of the State of New York and Mr. Grady Miller, and with the personal involvement of Keith Parfitt and the team at Capabilities Partnership. His role was to work--and is currently to work--with faculty in developing research projects and programs, and he does the deep research and analysis, summarizing literature and fitting his analysis to meet the needs of faculty. He works within the library and in the reference department with Derek Sanderson, a librarian faculty member at the College. Marcus has flourished in this role--working on a wide variety of projects (some of which are disability related) and serving faculty across disciplines. A major project Marcus will be working on--and one that was created by Dr. Lawrence Force (Professor of Psychology and Co-Director of the Center on Aging and Disability Policy at Mount Saint Mary College, Newburgh, NY), and myself, Dr. Jeffrey Kahana (Associate Professor of History and Co-Director of the Center on Aging and Disability Policy at Mount Saint Mary College, Newburgh, NY) and Elaine Sproat, the Director of the Pro-Active Caring Project at the Center on Aging and Disability Policy at Mount Saint Mary College, Newburgh, NY), and funded by the New York State Developmental Disability Planning Conference (DDPC), is aimed to help family caregivers manage the many complex challenges they face. Brain Injury Awareness

Each year, traumatic brain injuries (TBI) contribute to a substantial number of deaths and cases of permanent disability. A TBI is caused by a bump, blow or jolt to the head or by a penetrating head injury that disrupts the normal function of the brain.

Of the 1.7 million who sustain a TBI each year in the United States:

- 52,000 fatalities
- 275,000 are hospitalized
- 1,365,000 are treated and released from the ER
- The number of people with TBI who receive no care is unknown

Epilepsy Awareness

- Epilepsy is a disorder of the brain that causes seizures.
- Epilepsy can affect people in very different ways. This is because there are many causes and many different kinds of
- The way a seizure looks depends on the type of seizure a person is experiencing. Some seizures can look like staring spells. Other seizures can cause a person to collapse, shake, and become unaware of what's going on around them.
- Epilepsy can be caused by different conditions that affect a person's brain. Many times the cause is unknown. Some causes include:
 - Stroke
 - Brain Tumor 0
 - Traumatic Brain Injury or head injury
 - Central Nervous System Infection
- A person with epilepsy is not contagious and cannot give epilepsy to another person.
- A person with epilepsy is encouraged to work with their healthcare provider to determine the best care and treatment (CDC, 2018)

Autism Awareness

- Autism now affects 1 in 68 children
- It is estimated that nearly 1/3 of individuals with ASD have concurrent seizure disorders (Autism Speaks)
- Many genetic disorders are associated with both epilepsy and autism (UCLA Center for Autism Research & Treatment)
- Autism is one of the fastest-growing developmental disorders in the U.S. and its prevalence is growing
- Autism costs a family \$60,000 a year on average
- Boys are nearly five times more likely than girls to have autism
- There is no medical detection or cure for autism
